Another New Venue For Canoe & Brew On Sunday September 24

The Wisconsin Canoe Heritage Museum (WCHM) will host its “Canoe & Brew” event from 3:00 pm to 6:00 pm on Sunday September 24th, and once again it will move to a new venue.

“We want to make each year a unique event,” explained Canoe & Brew committee chair Debbie Koehn, “and this year we thought we would try an indoor event with a few new twists.” Round Man Brewing in downtown Spooner, Wisconsin, will be the site for this fourth annual end-of-the-season celebration in 2023. Round Man has provided the beer tasting in past years for Canoe & Brew, and this year they will be opening up their entire brewery to WCHM for the event and providing food as well. “We’re very grateful to the Churchill family and all the folks at Round Man for helping us sponsor Canoe & Brew,” says Koehn.

While attendees are sampling the local brew, they can expect to meet some interesting personalities, hear some live music, and have a chance to win some of the extra raffle prizes that will be given away before the drawing for the annual canoe raffle. This year’s event will be limited to 100 attendees, so reservations are highly recommended. The cost for this museum fundraising event is \$25 per reservation, all fun included. The music of Blu Kanu in the beer garden was a big hit. The sibling harmonies of Artie and Rhoda Anderson had folks dancing, singing, and playing along. A surprise appearance by Glen Anderson on harmonica was an added treat. The last minute addition of Les Fils du Voyageur rounded out the entertainment. Their extensive collection of paddling, working and playing songs paint an interesting historical overview of the life and times of a voyageur.

WCHM Board of Directors Election & General Membership Meeting

The Wisconsin Canoe Heritage Museum is currently in the midst of its annual election for the Board of Directors. Current WCHM members are encouraged to participate and should receive a ballot and return envelope along with this newsletter (some past members may also receive a ballot and can participate by renewing their membership).

Four board positions are to be elected to three year terms, and there are four candidates on the ballot (along with space for write-ins). Ballots must be returned before September 15th and election results will be announced at the annual general membership meeting held via Zoom on Thursday September 21st. Candidate Mike Knuth

My name is Mike Knuth and I would like to express my interest in becoming a board member of the WCHM for many reasons. My interest in canoes and canoe tripping spans nearly a lifetime. It all started in 1963 when my dad bought a 1930s Thompson wood canvas canoe. My brother and I used it on the local rivers of Wisconsin for many years until it was retired to the barn for about 25 years. Recognizing both the personal history and the historical value of that canoe, I did a complete restoration and I still use it to this day and often show it at local boat shows.

That led to a deeper appreciation of wooden canoes and ultimately to the WCHM. I have a fond interest in canoe tripping and over the years have made many trips in the BWCA, Quetico, and Wabakimi Provincial parks. In 1996 and 1999, I organized two trips that retraced most of Sigurd Olson's 1955 trip down the Churchill River in Saskatchewan described in his book the "The Lonely Land". Recently, I have taken much interest in the WCHM. I have restored a canoe, built a skin on frame Greenland Kayak, and am currently building a replica of an 1881 J.H. Rushton Rob Roy design which he called the American Traveling Canoe. This project is my foray into lofting and lapstrake construction. I have taken a great interest in the works of Rushton and have studied the company history. Many of these projects were in part inspired and spurred on by my connection to the WCHM.

My wife and I are currently "Keymasters" at the museum which we enjoy. Meeting the varied visitors, answering questions, and getting people excited about the history and craftsmanship represented in the museum exhibits is rewarding. I like the small professional exhibits, the museum's mission and purpose, and I would like to participate in the operations of the WCHM. My professional career spanned 36 years working for the US Environmental Protection Agency in Duluth, MN. As a result, I have experience working in groups, committees, and interacting with scientists and the public. I feel that an organization cannot thrive unless it can successfully engage and excite the public. I am confident I can use my lifetime of experience and skills to help promote and sustain the WCHM into the future.




WCHM Attends Shell Lake Art Fair

WCHM To Receive Historic Hudson Bay Bound Canoe

Natalie Warren, paddling adventurer and author of *Hudson Bay Bound*, has offered her 17.4 foot Langford Prospector, in which she and Ann Raiho became the first two women to make the 2,000-mile journey by paddle from Minneapolis to Hudson Bay and also split the continent in half by completing the entire length of the Mississippi, to the Wisconsin Canoe Heritage Museum as a collection piece. Her speaking tour landed her at WCHM in April of 2022 and resulted in more than a standing room crowd on a snowy weekday evening.



Exhibit Hall Enjoying Busy Season

The WCHM exhibit hall is in the midst of its summer season, and visitation so far has been strong. In fact, as of the middle of July, the number of visitors is up 20% over the previous two year's figures. "Things really picked up after the July 4 holiday, and we're now averaging about nine to ten visitors a day," says WCHM Executive Director Jed Malischke. "Our Keymasters are doing a great job this year. So far we have not missed a day and over the holiday we were open ten days straight."

The normal schedule for the museum is from 10:00 am to 4:00 pm Wednesday through Saturday and 11:00 am to 3:00 pm on Sundays and Holidays (or anytime by appointment). The season will run through the end of September.
