Wild Rice Push Pole & Knocking Stick Workshop March 28 - March 30

Interested in making your own tools for wild ricing? The Wisconsin Canoe Heritage Museum and Hunt Hill Audubon Sanctuary are teaming up to sponsor a Wild Rice Push Pole & Knocking Stick Workshop on March 28-30, 2023. From 6-9 pm daily in this three-evening class in the museum workshop, your instructor Gary Dunsmoor will help you make a tamarack and maple push pole and a set of white cedar knocking sticks to use for wild ricing using traditional hand tools and techniques.

Tools and materials will be provided, but feel free to bring your own hand tools (such as: a draw knife, wood plane, and wood rasp) and personal protective equipment (safety glasses and gloves). You may work individually or bring a partner for the same price. Registration required by March 27; Limit: 8 individuals or couples (If you sign up as a couple, you only need to register and pay for one of the two people). 


WCHM Finishes Another Year With Positive Financial Results

The Wisconsin Canoe Heritage Museum completed fiscal year 2022 in good financial shape. Total revenues for the year were close to \$66,000, with exhibit hall admissions and raffle sales both showing significant and welcome gains over the previous year. The exhibit hall was open a record 96 days over the four months of the summer season and recorded 643 visitors in that time, both numbers being up about 11% from the previous year. One negative in 2022 was the loss in the value of the WCHM Endowment Fund as a result of the poor investment climate during the year. "It's frustrating when losses like this occur due to circumstances beyond your control," laments WCHM Executive Director Jed Malischke, "but it's a consolation to know that our investment gains over the past three years far exceed the loss we incurred this year."

Expenses for WCHM in 2022 totaled about \$60,000, with some one-time consultant fees (marketing and legal advice) as well as increases in building and facility costs (utilities and collection storage furnishings). Otherwise it was business as usual and WCHM was left with a surplus of over \$6,000. Adding that surplus to the net worth of the organization has increased it by 5% to over \$134,000. "We feel good about these results," says Malischke, "and we're looking forward to the New Year to make more gains towards our long term goals in 2023."





2023 WCHM Canoe Raffle Will Feature Two MacKenzie-Yost Models




1st Annual Birch Bark Canoe Rendezvous Sept 14-17 in Maine

A first annual Birch Bark Canoe Rendezvous is being planned to coincide with the Living History Heritage 2nd annual "Long Weekend" to be held on Hardwood Point near Harrington, Maine, on September 14-17, 2023. The Long Weekend features period encampments and regalia from the 1600s to 1700s, as well as "grand jollifications" (music and entertainment). The Birch Bark Canoe Rendezvous is expected to feature canoes representing the Abenaki, Maliseet, Mi'kmaq, Passamaquoddy and Penobscot traditions, as well as additional canoes brought by attendees. Marquette Jolliet Expedition On Mississippi to be Recreated For 350th Anniversary

This year is the 350th anniversary of the 1673 expedition by Louis Jolliet and Father Jacques Marquette's landmark expedition that led to the claiming of the entire land and water mass interior of what we now know of as America for Louis XIV, King of France. In May the French Heritage Society, as part of the French Heritage Corridor Initiative, plans to celebrate the anniversary by re-creating the expedition. The Jolliet-Marquette Expedition 3 will start from St. Ignace Michigan on May 17th, 2023, and its seven participants and two canoes will live the voyager life as they travel by water south to the confluence of the Mississippi and the Arkansas rivers. The Wisconsin Canoe Heritage Museum (WCHM) in Spooner is seeking volunteers to join its team of Keymasters. "These are the folks that dedicate three or four hours every couple of weeks during the summer to open the museum exhibit hall to visitors," explains WCHM Executive Director Jed Malischke, "No special knowledge or skills are required, just a friendly attitude and a willingness to be prompt and responsible."

The museum exhibit hall is a pleasant place to spend your time while helping keep this Northwest Wisconsin institution open. The exhibit hall opens for each summer on Memorial Day Weekend, when the WCHM puts on its Wisconsin Canoe Heritage Day. After that date the exhibit hall is open from Wednesday through Saturday 10:00 am to 4:00 pm and on Sundays from 11:00 am to 3:00 pm. Keymasters work either half a day or a whole day, whichever they wish, and set their own schedule of days.
